


Example website layout on different screen sizes - header and footer







In tablet view, the newsletter sign-up box should be hidden by default, but revealed automatically if the header link is tapped.


The two lists of links should initially sit under one another as the screen narrows from desktop to tablet view, before being hidden under their respective titles.



Example website layout on different screen sizes - megamenu & CTA dropdowns












In tablet view, the megamenu would be too cumbersome to use, so the main menu becomes single-level.











The guanaco lives in herds made up of male, a few females, and young calves.


